

On April 1, 1869, the Nebraska School for the Deaf (NSD) opened in Omaha, Nebraska. From its founding until 1998, the school educated more than 2,000 students. The campus was situated on 23 acres northwest of Omaha. NSD was established by William DeCoursey French, a deaf individual. Although the school no longer operates, its former campus has become integrated into the surrounding North Omaha community and ABIDE.

If the NSD were still in operation today, it would have celebrated its 156th anniversary. The spirit of the school lives on, as the Nebraska School for the Deaf Alumni Association (NSDAA) continues to foster connections among alumni.
